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REGISTRATION BOOKS FOR MAY 27 PRIMARY CLOSE TOMORROW

Qualified Pitt county citizens whose names are not already on the list of eligible voters must register in their respective precincts not later than sunset tomorrow (Saturday) if they wish to participate in the primary on Saturday, May 27.

In accordance with State laws governing elections, the registrars will have registration books at the voting place in every precinct tomorrow from 9 a. m. until the books are closed at sunset. Those eligible to vote but who have not taken trouble to get their names on the books are advised and warned to do so, or else their only activity in the May 27 primary will be as a spectator.

Persons wishing to qualify must be at least 21 years of age, or will become 21 before the date of the general election, November 7, 1950, and must also be able to read and write any section of the State Constitution in the English language to the satisfaction unless they are permanently registered under the "Grandfather Clause."

It is also required that the voter-to-be must have been a resident of the State for at least one year, or will have been by the date of the November election, and a resident of the precinct in which he wishes to vote for at least four months preceding the election.

General rules concerning the qualifications of voters state that a person is not eligible to vote if he has moved from one county to another within four months of the election. However, if he has moved from one precinct to another, but in the same county within the period prescribed, he is allowed to vote but must do so in the precinct from which he moved.

J. B. Joyner, registrar for Farmville precinct, will have the registration books at the town hall, Farmville's voting place, tomorrow to register voters and to clarify regulations concerning eligibility.

Contracts Let For Road Projects In Pitt And Greene Counties

One highway project in Greene and several in Pitt were included in a group of contracts awarded recently by the State Highway Commission.

The work in Greene calls for hard-surfacing 5.4 miles, beginning at US 263, one mile north of Snow Hill, and extending eastward to highway NC 123, 3.3 miles south of Maury. Sam Tinsy, Inc., of Roanoke, Va., was the successful bidder with an offer of \$33,778.00.

Except for work in Farmville and Ayden, the work in Pitt was primarily in the eastern half of the county. White Construction company was awarded the contract for grading and hard-surfacing 3.6 miles from a point near St. Johns northeast through Coville to the Gardensville-Stokes-town road.

The same firm was awarded the contract for grading and hard-surfacing the link between Chicod school and US 264, 7.5 miles east of Greenville, and the road extending from NC 43 at Bell Fork through Simpson to US 264, 7.6 miles east of Greenville.

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Party Members Urged Register and 'Get Out the Vote'

More than 100 people attended the Pitt county Democratic convention last Saturday in the courthouse at Greenville.

John G. Clark was elected chairman of the Pitt county Democratic executive committee, a position he has held since 1945. Mrs. Curtis Spencer of Black Jack was re-elected vice chairman and Gilbert Peels of Greenville was elected second vice chairman a new office which was created this year.

Sixty delegates to the state convention and 60 alternates were named from Pitt's 20 precincts.

Chairman Clark, presiding at the convention, urged the people of the precincts to get out a record vote in the coming primary. He urged the Democrats to work for the candidates of their choice during the primary, but to stay within the party ranks after the primary, regardless of who wins the nomination.
