

An independent census, taken and sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Fred C. Moore, executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, shows that Farmville's population is 3,026, or a total of 85 nore than the official census which was started on April 1, and the results of which were announced three weeks ago. The new count gives the town a gain of 46 over the 1940 census, while the official census showed a loss of 39 inhabitants for the 10year period.
