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Plans For Community Chest Will Be Made At Mass Meeting Wed. Night

Plans for a Community Chest in Farmville, or for one concerted drive for funds each year instead of a multitude of campaigns for money, all of them being for worthy causes, were discussed Wednesday night at a meeting of representative citizens, and will be continued next Wednesday night at 8 o'clock at which time interested citizens of the town are asked to assemble in a mass meeting at the town hall.

Irvine Morgan, who presided at the meeting Wednesday night after Mayor Walter Jones had explained the purpose of the gathering, appointed John E. Lewis, Sam Bundy and Jones as members of a committee which is to make definite proposals and recommendations at the forthcoming meeting.

The town at present has a committee that was named several years ago to administer funds that were raised in the USO drives. Morgan is the head of that committee. Others who have been serving with him are Curtis H. Flanagan, R. A. Joyner, Manly Liles and C. M. Faylor.

Opinion has been expressed that one central, concentrated drive for funds, which, in turn, would be administered by a committee of responsible citizens, would be preferable to the present system of having drive on top of drive.

It is expected that the meeting Wednesday night will be well attended.
