
Policeman Wounded, Negro Killed In Gun Fight Thursday Morning Several Miles West Of Farmvil

Lessie Sylvester Stocks, 25-yearold Negro of Louisburg, Route 1, was shot and killed Thursday morn ing about 11 o'clock after he had opened fire on, and twice wounded, Policeman Joe Gregory of the Farmville police department. Gregory's wounds, in the arm and shoulder were not serious enough to require hospitalization.

The gun-fight occcurred west of Farmville, about one and a quarter miles from Jack Lewis' home.

With Police Chief L. T. Lucas Gregory was seeking clues which might lead to the arrest of the driver of a stolen automobile which was wrecked and shandoned Wednesday night on the Wilson highway. They were also seeking clues that might lead to the return of Gregory's car, which was stoln several nights frim the town parking lot.

Stocks was alone in the house, or the Lang farm, and opened fire on Gregory when he walked in the front door. The policeman was shot with a .22 Winchester rifle, Lucas said Stocks fired two or three times, and there were 13 rounds left in the gun.

Lucas stated that he had gone a round to the back of the house and was fixing to arrest a Negro who was on the outside, hiding in the bushes, when the shots were fired. The Negro escaped when Lucas rushed to Gregory's aid.

Officers stated that the Negroe had been hiding out in the house and that there was evidence that some one had been carrying them food.
