Baptist Study Course To Be Given By Missionary

Miss Emelle Brooks of Greenville, who is home on a year's furlough from her work as a missionary to Africa, will be the featured speaker at the School of Missions for All Ages which will be held Monday and Tuesday nights in the Baptist church, beginning at 7 o'clock.

Miss Brooks will speak to the adults and young people. Miss Miriam Johnson will teach the Junior Girls auxiliary and the Royal Ambassadors. Miss Margaret Lewis will have charge of the Sunbeams.

A nursery will be provided for the small children and babies of mothers desiring to attend the study.

Refreshments will be served. Concluding the evening's work will be a showing of pictures by Miss Brooks, who has been on the staff of the Girls school at Abokuta, Nigeria, as a nurse and teacher. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Brooks.

This year marks the first time the whole church has participated in a mission study simultaneously. The public is especially invited to see the pictures Miss Brooks will show.

After graduating from Greenville high school in 1933, Miss Brooks attended Mars Hill college and received a degree from ECTC in 1937. After teaching one year, she entered Johns Hopkins School of Nursing in 1938. She graduated in 1941 and returned to Greenville to work with Dr. Hayes Going to Washington, D. C., she did public health work with the Instructional Visiting Nurse society — two years as staff nurse and three years as supervisor. She was appointed by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist convention in July, 1947, to Nigeria, West Africa. For the past three years her work has been in the girls school where 360 are enrolled. The school offers work from kindergarten through college.

Brief Ceremony Marks Observance Of UN Day Here

In a brief ceremony at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning in the high school gymnasium, United Nations day was observed in Farmville.

Rev. Z. B. T. Cox asked the assembly to stand as he prayed, petitioning that we might have the spirit of those great men who formulated the UN. He read the preamble to the United Nations charter and the president's proclamation asking municipalities to observe the fifth anniversary of the founding of the organization by which peace-loving nations of the world are trying to permanently outlaw war.

Jack Tyson, commander of the local post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, presented the blue and white UN flag to Mayor Walter B. Jones, who accepted it for the town with thanks. He remarked, "Some 150 years ago our country designed, not in its present form, its own flag. Today in accepting this UN flag, we, in no wise, should belittle it or let it overshadow the American flag. Let us stop and remember that the only hope of American people is in the strength and success of the UN. . . The flag shall be given its rightful place in our community."

The flag was then given to Boy Scouts who held it on the stage during the remainder of the ceremony. Commander W. D. Creekmunk of the American Legion led the pledge of allegiance to the American flag. The high school band played the National anthem. Rev. E. W. Holmes closed a moment of silent prayer.

The ceremony was planned for the school lawn but was forced indoors by rain. Before and after the program, attended mostly by school children and faculty, the band played.

Cox Speaks At UN Anniversary Meeting

Rev. Z. B. T. Cox, pastor of the Farmville Christian church, was speaker Tuesday night at the United Nations celebration held by the Seven Pines home demonstration club. The club was the only one in the county to observe the fifth anniversary of the founding of UN.
