





Today in accepting this UN flag, we, in no wise, should belittle it or let if overshadow the American flag. Let us stop and remember that the only hope of American people is in the strength and success of the UN. . . . The flag shall be given its rightful place in our community."

The flag was then given to Boy Scouts who held it on the stage during the remainder of the ceremony. Commander W. D. Creekmur of the American Legion led the pledge of allegiance to the American flag. The high school band played the National anthem. Rev. E. W. Holmes closed a moment of silent prayer.
