Literary Club Hears Talk On Passion Play Given In Germany

Members of the Literary club and special guests enjoyed hearing A. M. Noble of Smithfield recount his visit to Oberammergau, an unrivaled scenic spot in the valley of Bavaria, Germany, where he attended the performance of The Passion Play. Marshall Plan Funds (\$238,000) erased war damages and made possible the revival of Oberammergau's Passion Play, which has its beginnings in the history of the Thirty Years' War (1634) and the famine and "Black Death." When 84 of the village's 300 residents died, the village council assembled in the church and made a solemn yow that if the village was spared they would perform, every tenth year, a play depicting the sufferings of parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Lang. immediately ceased and the next year the Passion of the Savior was enacted for the first time. Only in the Napoleonic troubles and the crisis of World War I and II has the ten-year schedule been disrupted. Mr. Noble said all participants of the Passion Play must be natives of Oberammergau or must have resided there at least 20 years; the actors are selected for life. action likeness of each character role and no married person can play the part of Mary or Magdalene.
