Roland Morgan, whose par-ents, Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Morgan of Farmville, Route 2, were notified on December 4 that he had been wounded in Korea, has arrived at Madigan General hospital, Fort Lewis, Wash-ington. He was wounded in action November 26. He was in a hospital in Japan in September for several weeks for an operation to remove a

in the fighting.

Morgan enlisted in the Army November 27, 1948, and received his basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C. He was sent to Fort Lewis in March, 1949, and remained there until going overseas in July. He had trouble with his leg while stationed at Fort Lewis. When he wrote from the hospital in Japan and did not explain that he had been injured, his mother assumed that the same leg was infected again.

The last word the Morgans had received from their son was in a letter, dated November 6, and received about November 15.

Tuesday they received a letter from Chaplain Harms J. Gunhas, stating that he had visited Pfc. Morgan at Madigan, but gave no details of the injuries.

The Morgans have another son in the service of his country. He is Sgt. David Morgan, who enlisted in January, 1947, and is now stationed at Pope Field, Fort Bragg.
