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## Local Rotarians Honored at Large Intercity Meeting

210 Rotarians and Rotary Amos assembled in Farmville Tuesday night for an intercity meeting of the Farmville, Ayden, Snow Hill, Kinston and Lenoir clubs.

Farmville was honored at the huge turnout.

President Walter Jones of the host club made it clear at the beginning that the program would not be of a serious nature but would further the cause of Rotary through association and fellowship, and this idea, while a departure from the usual procedure, proved to be very acceptable to those attending.

Charlie McCullers of Kinston, who served as master of ceremonies, placed the group in a receptive mood by awarding the door prizes and conducting a community sing. After dinner more prizes were awarded and the introduction of special guests was in order. Howard McGinnis, district governor, was unable to be present, but according to Russell Foster of Kinston, the meeting was not without its "brass," and Irvin Morgan of Farmville and Gene Booth of Kinston were both introduced as past district governors.

Highlight of the evening was when Joe King of Raleigh and Winston-Salem began his performance. King, a member of the 1961 House of Representatives and a man of many talents, through the art of ventriloquism, proved to their own amazement that some of the Farmville citizens are gifted as vocalists, to the delight of those present.

Next week there will be no regular meeting of the Rotarians on Tuesday night, as there will be a consolidated meeting on Monday night, the annual Chamber of Commerce dinner, a joint meeting of the Jaycees, Rotarians and Kiwanis.

## REVIVAL BEGINS SUNDAY IN CHURCH AT WALSTONBURG

Rev. Arthur D. Wenger, assistant to the president of Atlantic Christian college in Wilson, will conduct revival services next week in the Walstonburg Christian church. The services begin Sunday night at 7:45 and services will be held nightly at 7:45.

Rev. Howard James of Elizabeth City will be song leader. J. R. Shoen in Farmville will be the pianist. Sam Jenkins, chairman of the board, states that the church is extremely fortunate in securing Mr. Wenger, who is much in demand as a speaker. He conducted a series of pre-Easter services last week in the Wilson church and the week before that held a revival in the Hood Memorial church, Dunn.

A native of Aberdeen, Idaho, Mr. Wenger received his early educational preparation in Aberdeen and graduated from Bethel college in Newton, Kansas, with an A. B. degree in 1941. He later attended San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, Calif. He graduated from Bible College of the Bible, Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, Texas, with the B. D. degree in 1944. During his collegiate career he traveled extensively with the college quartet and was elected to Who's Who Among College and University Students. He was also a member of the Alpha Psi Omega fraternity.

His activities and interests since graduating from college include pastoring in Shafter, California, Hamilton and Arlington, Texas. He was chaplain in the Army for two years and for a year was associate minister of the First Christian church in New Castle, Pa. He has taught in Young People's summer conferences in California, Kansas, Texas and Pennsylvania.
