DRIVENETS LOTS OF PAPER, BUT NOT SO MANY GREENBACKS

Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs Will Direct Local Cancer Crusade

A campaign to collect \$700 in the Farmville community for the annual Cancer Crusade begins next week according to an announcement by W. B. Jones, president of the Rotary club, and Charles Edwards, president of the Kiwanis club, sponsors of the local drive, with the assistance of the Junior Woman's club.

The importance of the campaign and the Cancer Crusade are emphasized in the following proclamation, issued by Mayor Jones:

Last year some 210,000 families lost a father, a mother, or a child to cancer. Of these more than 100,000 were in the prime of life, between the ages of 30 and 65. They were stricken when their families, their work and their communities needed them most.

Those who have lost a dear one know cancer as a terrible threat. They know that the disease reaches beyond the patient to the family and loved ones, all of whom must share a serious burden.

Physicians can now cure half of those who develop cancer if the disease is diagnosed early and treated promptly. Today, however, only about one in four who have the disease are being saved.

We as individuals have a great responsibility; we can strike back at cancer through spreading life-giving facts and through contributions to the Cancer Crusade. Lives will be saved—in our country, our state, our community, and perhaps in our own families.

Therefore, I, Walter B. Jones, Mayor of Farmville, take pleasure in proclaiming April as Cancer Control Month. I call on all citizens to join in the Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society. I heartily subscribe to the Crusade's theme: Guard your family. Strike back. Give to Conquer Cancer.

Admission will be 25 cents for children and 50c for adults.

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Plans For Farmers Day Outlined At C-of-C Annual Dinner Meeting

Plans for Farmers Day, which local citizens believe will be one of the best good-will builders this town has ever seen, were outlined Monday night at the annual dinner meeting of the Chamber of Commerce by Sam B. Bundy, who is serving as general chairman of the event.

Wednesday, May 9, has been designated as the date for the event, which business men have long dreamed of as one way the town can express its appreciation to the surrounding sections.

The festivities will begin early in the afternoon with a parade that will include bands, floats and the contestants in the beauty contest. The parade will be started so that it will end at Monk's Warehouse, No. 1, where a program of musical entertainment and an outstanding speaker will be provided. Alex Allen is in charge of the committee selecting the out-of-town speaker.

The evening program, starting at 7:30 or 8 o'clock, will consist of entertainment by radio groups and a beauty contest. Residents of towns with populations in excess of 2,500 are not eligible for the contest. The queen will receive a prize of \$100 in cash; the runner-up will receive \$50, and \$25 will go to the third place winner. The Seven Pines Home Demonstration club has already notified President Eli Joyner, Jr., that it will have a candidate in the beauty contest and a float in the parade.

The day's program will be climaxed with a dance. There will be round dancing and square dancing.

While an explanation of Farmers Day plans constituted an important part of the dinner meeting, it was far from being the whole show.

President Joyner introduced four high school students—Jackie Wilford, Willie Mae Harper, Carolyn Roebuck and Robert Everett Roebuck—who presented musical numbers and Ernest Petteway supervised the presentation of several prizes.

Secretary Fred Moore summarized the work of the group during the year and outlined some of the trade promotion events that had been carried out.

Special guests were Badger Johnson and W. T. Kiser, president and manager, respectively, of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce.

Horton Boatman had as his guest his father-in-law, Ralph Lutz of Ohio, and Charlie Bateman was the guest of Henry Johnson.

Frank Allen introduced Mr. Bundy.

3 Commissioners Seek Re-election
