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Local Soldier Commended For Korean Service

Pfc. David R. Nanney, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Nanney of Farmville Route 2, recently was commended by his commanding officer for exemplary performance of duty. He is fighting in Korea with the 17th Infantry Regiment.

His regiment participated in two amphibious landings, and later spear-headed the United Nations advance to the Manchurian border. Recently the "Buffaloes" knifed through enemy resistance and secured the eastern end of the Hwachon Reservoir in North Korea during "Operation Rugged."

A veteran of 14 months service, Nanney attended Farmville school prior to his enlistment.

PLANS MADE FOR POPPY DAY, MAY 26

Farmvillians will again be offered bright red crepe paper poppies next Saturday, May 26, by the American Legion auxiliary. Mrs. J. P. Jones, poppy chairman, will direct the drive.

The idea of a poppy as a memorial flower for World War dead was inspired by the glooming wild poppies "between the crosses row on row" in the battle cemeteries of World War I. Poppies which are worn in the United States are crepe paper replicas of those wild European poppies, made by veterans in hospitals and convalescent workrooms throughout the country.

Doctors in veterans hospitals consider poppy-making a valuable form of occupational therapy. The psychological effect of having work to do, and being paid for it, rebuilds patients' pride and self-respect. This year the Legion auxiliary will pay out approximately one half million dollars to the veterans who make the poppies. During 1950 the auxiliary distributed more than 22 million poppies.

When you pin a poppy to your lapel, you will not only be providing for disabled veterans, but honoring the fallen comrades of the Korean and two World Wars.

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Airman Killed In Japan Buried In Snow Hill

Funeral services for First Lt. Carl E. Gallagher, 27, husband of Mrs. Christine Shirley Gallagher of Walstonburg, were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 at Edwards Funeral home in Snow Hill. Rev. C. L. Patrick and Rev. J. L. Moye officiated. Graveside rites were in charge of a military detachment from Pope Air base.

Lt. Gallagher was killed in an airplane accident on March 30 while he was stationed at Iwakuni, Japan. He served three years with the USAF, during World War II and flew 86 missions in the South Pacific. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters and other decorations. Entering State college after his return from service, he graduated in June, 1949, and entered service in October, 1949, and at that time was ordered overseas.
