NOTICE TO CITIZENS AND RESIDENTS OF THE TOWN OF FARMVILLE AND TO THE CITIZENS AND RESIDENTS RESIDING JUST WEST OF FARMVILLE IN THE AREA BETWEEN HAY BLVD. AND THE GOLF COURSE

Under and pursuant to the power and authority granted in Article 35, Sub-Chapter 6 of Chapter 166 of the North Carolina General Statute, and pursuant to a resolution unanimously adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Farmville in a regular session held on Tuesday, June 26, 1951, notice is hereby given to the citizens and residents of the Town of Farmville and to the citizens and residents residing just west of the Farmville City Limits and especially to Tabitha E. DeLoach, Pitt County Board of Education and the Farmville Country Club, who owns the land, or an interest therein, hereinafter described, that the Board of Commissioners at their regular meeting to be held on Tuesday, August 7th, 1951, at 9 o'clock, P. M., in the Court Room of the Town Hall in Farmville, N. C., will consider the annexation of the territory hereinafter described to the corporate territory of the Town of Farmville and intend to adopt an ordinance extending its corporate limits by annexing thereto all of the land and buildings thereon described as follows:

BEGINNING at the intersection of U. S. Highway No. 258 and Horton Street, being the Northeastly intersection of said Highway and Street; thence along Horton Street N 45-30 E 200 feet; thence N 4-45 E 200 feet to a stake in the old City Limits line; thence continuing along the City Limits line N 23-15 W 1505 feet to a stake; thence N 65-45 E 200 feet to a stake; thence S 25-15 E 200 feet to the school property; thence N 32-45 E 121 feet; thence N 35-15 E 22 feet; thence S 60-05 E 142 feet to the Golf Course line; thence along the Golf Course line S 10-50 W 1050 feet to the present City Limits line; thence along the present City Limits line N 74-15 W 100 feet to Horton Street; thence along Horton Street S 45-30 W 172 feet to U. S. Highway No. 258 right-of-way; thence in a Northerly direction along Highway 258 right-of-way 40.5 feet to the point of beginning, according to a map filed by Thomas W. Rivers, C. E., in April, 1951, and being the identical tract proposed for annexation to the territory of the Town of Farmville, North Carolina.
