## TOWN AWARDS CONTRACT FOR SERVICING PUBLIC VEHICLES

Moore and Speight service station has been awarded the contract for furnishing gas, oil, and lubrication service for the town-owned vehicles.

The Board of Commissioners Tuesday night received bids from several local service stations and awarded the contract to the lowest bidder. The firm agrees to sell gas to the town at 4.2 cents per gallon less than the posted retail price, and premium oil at 33 cents per quart. Trucks are to be greased for 35 cents and washed for 35 cents. Cars will be either washed or lubricated for 70 cents.
