It was introduced into the United States in 1847, in the New England states.

Mrs. Gaynor stated that chrysanthemums should be transplanted not later than May 15, in a well prepared soil and that the best fertilization was barn lot fertilizer. She told members how to care for plants during the growing season and of best keeping methods when ready to cut.
