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NEW COMMERCIAL PRODUCTS

New products on the market offer to help out civilians in a time of shortages.

U. S. Radiator Corp. of Detroit has a new model automatic furnace that will burn either coal, gas or oil, depending on which one is easiest to get at the time.

The company says this home heater can be "easily and economically converted from one fuel to another if a fuel shortage should occur."

American Cyanamid Co. of New York has developed a new resin paint ingredient for military use that doesn't contain castor oil, which is on the scarce list.

This new product meets military requirements for a fast-drying and durable finish for ammunition, the company says, and also has excellent color, gloss and valuable film properties.

Civil defense signs that glow in the dark are being made by Norco Products Mfg. Co. of New York. The signs are made of plastic and the glow is from a phosphorescent substance that stores up light and emits it in the dark for 8 to 12 hours. The signs are guaranteed for two years. They come in standard wordings of "shelter," "exit" and other such directions and also are made to order.

A low-cost profitable signal flasher has been developed by the Halody Electronics Co. of New York. The flasher uses a cold cathode tube powered by three standard 90 volt batteries in series to produce a sharp brilliant flash visible for about a mile. It is packaged in a rainproof aluminum case 6 by 8 by 10 inches and weighs 4 1/2 pounds.

For those little emergencies when

a hole is gouged in your very best plastic draper or table cloth, the Novelty Plastic of Washington, D. C. has a patching kit. It contains a bottle of liquid plastic and 12 ready-to-use patches.

J. L. Golding Co. of Chicago has a clothes closet stretcher which it says expands any closet by as much as 25 per cent. The new product is a strong steel track running the length of the closet, on which slide steel carriers. These carriers have two loops on which regular coat hangers are suspended, one five inches below the other. Thus each carrier holds two garments, one slightly below the other so that shoulder pads won't be crushed. They come in two sizes—one adjustable from 24 to 42 inches with 12 carriers holding 24 garments, and the other adjustable from 42 to 72 inches with 20 carriers holding 40 garments.

A clear wax coating to make wallpaper waterproof and washable has been put on the market by Sterling Value Co. of Great Neck, N. Y. It is applied with a cloth. And the company says it also can be used on woodwork, furniture and auto-


mobiles.

A transparent ceiling based on vinylite resin is being made by the Merchants Chemical Co. of Stamford, Conn. The resin is a clear plastic film that can be used to prevent rainwater from penetrating the ceiling. The ceiling is brushed on and allowed to dry. It is removed by simply peeling off the film. The ceiling is guaranteed against salt air, fumes, alcohol, acids, and alkalis.

U. S. Rubber Co. of New York has started marketing a new plastic rain-carrying mat for use in the textile industry as a replacement for wooden gulleys. The mat is made of a blend of plastic and rubber and the company says because of its toughness it is expected to last two or three times longer than wooden gulleys.

A new type of plastic anchor is being made by Massachusetts Plastic Co., Inc., of Jamaica, N. Y. The plastic anchor is hammered into a drilled hole and cold-flow under pressure into crevices to give an extra grip. Screws or nails can then be driven into the anchor.
