Vocational Fair At Maury School Features Exhibits

Sponsored jointly by the Maury Ruritan and the Home Demonstration Clubs of Maury and Mt. Hermon, Maury's annual vocational fair will be held Friday (today) on the school grounds and in the gymnasium. There are nine classes of exhibits in the boys' division and four in the girls'. Featured on the school grounds will be 24 swine exhibits, eight beef cattle projects and a greasy pig contest. Booths and exhibits in the gymnasium include 18 corn exhibits, nine tobacco projects and one boy in the 10th, 11th and 12th grades will exhibit an article of woodwork and a farm tool that he has repaired.

In the girls' division there will be thirteen canned food projects, fourteen cake projects, five handicraft articles, eleven skirt and waist sewing projects, three dress sewing projects, one jumper sewing project, one jumper and jacket sewing project, and seven articles of clothing in the sewing division which were made without supervision. Educational exhibits will include one on proper swine sanitation, prepared and exhibited by members of the 9th grade vocational agriculture class, a showing in colored slides of summer projects of the members of the Maury Chapter of Future Farmers of America, a room improvement exhibit prepared and exhibited by Margaret Murphrey and Nola Ann Murphrey, under the direction of Mrs. Margaret Jones, home economics teacher in the Maury School, and how to prepare a Thanksgiving table, prepared and exhibited by the 10th grade members of the Future Home Makers club in the Maury High School.

As a special feature of the fair this year, the Maury Ruritan club will sponsor a greasy pig chase for boys and the Home Demonstration Club will sponsor a chicken chase for

girls. This event will get under way at 2 P.M. on the school grounds. Opening of exhibits will begin at 10:00 A.M. Judges for the fair are to be George B. Roberts, teacher of vocational agriculture in the Hooker High School, L. B. Outlaw, assistant county agent of Lenoir county, and Mr. J. B. McLawhorn, Extension agent of the Maury Ruritan club and local farmer.

Prizes and awards for winners of exhibits in the fair will be presented during a program in the school auditorium beginning at 8 o'clock. Main attraction for the night program will

be a best dressed man contest in which lady members of the Home Demonstration club will dress as men and compete for prizes, and a womanless wedding to be presented by members of the Maury Ruritan club. Cash prizes will be awarded to the FFA girls by Mrs. Kirby Wooten, president of the Maury Home Demonstration club, and to FFA and 4-H boys by Lois May, president of the Maury Ruritan club. Admission charge for the night attraction will be 15 and 25 cents.

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
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
