of the North Carolina Jental Asso-ciation, played a vital part in the movement that culminated in 1960, in the establishing of a Destal School, first in this state, at the University of North Carolina.

Senator Jones in his first term in 1949 introduced a bill on the senate floor, asking for an appropriation of one million dollars and the necessary legislation to establish a school of Dentistry at the University of North Carolina. The bill, sponsored by the backing of the North Carolina Dental Association and steered by Dr. Jones, was passed and work begun on the buildings for the school.

The first class entered the school in the 1950-51 school year. In 1951-the Generall Assembly appropriated \$650,000 for further development of

The dentists of North Carolina sensing the need of aid to further the education and research program of the school organized the North Caro-lina Dental Foundation, Inc.

At the annual meeting of the Foundation in Chapel Hill, Saturday, Dr. Jones, vice-president, presided in the absence of the president, H. O. Lineberger of Raleigh. The sessions were held in Gerrard Hall.

The fund rasing campaign, begun a month ago, with \$100,000 as a goal, transfer to the Rocky Mount store. was reported as almost realized. Pledges and contributions had already amounted to \$95,000.

During the meeting Chancellor Robert B. House, who greeted the dentists, praised the work of Dr. Jones, who, as State Senator, "went to bat for the State and the region. We here are grateful that the University of North Carolina was your unanimous choice for the location of the state's dental school."


