REFUGEES
The one millionth refugee to be resettled by the International Refugee Organization arrived recently in this country...

MILK
Retail prices for milk have continued to rise, according to the Agriculture Department. Prices for standard grade milk delivered to homes in 25 representative major cities averaged 22.6 cents a quart...

BABY CHICKS
Production of baby chicks by commercial hatcheries this year will set a record of 1,750,000,000. The previous record was 1,620,000,000 set in 1948.

1948. The demand for baby chicks has been largely responsible for the big output, according to the Agriculture Department.

WAR CLAIMS
The War Claims Commission urges all former prisoners of World War II to file claims for benefits immediately if they have not already done so. Although Congress has extended the final date for the filing of claims to March 31, the Commission said it hoped to have all claims settled by the end of the year.

VIOLATIONS
A total of 13,283 investigations into alleged violations of OPS price regulations were begun in October. There were 14,463 investigations pending on October 1 and, during October, 6,453 investigations were completed. Of the 28,736 establishments investigated in October, 7,192 were found to be in violation of price regulations.

SPECIAL DAYS AND WEEKS
The Department of Commerce has announced a list of nearly 500 special days and weeks to be observed by various groups in the next three months. The full year's list, to be published soon, will include about 400 special events and holidays.

NOT PAYABLE
Foster parents who receive payments from licensed child-placing agencies for expenses incurred in giving homes to children need not include these sums as part of their gross income, according to the U. S. Children's Bureau.

HOUSING SHORTAGE
Government statistics reveal that housing shortages in dozens of America's largest cities have interrupted the mass migration of workers from farms to defense factories, which started with the Korean War in June, 1950. Thousands of men and women are deserting the big war production centers and going home because they cannot find adequate housing for themselves and their families.

USED CAR PRICES
The Government has rolled back ceiling prices on used automobiles six per cent below the levels of last January. The few dollars-and-cents ceilings set prices at about current market levels. An exception to the immediate rollback will be 1951 models which may be sold at the going market price. The OPS specified that used cars on dealers lots must bear tags stating the make, model, line or series and the selling price, including any extra, special or optional equipment. The tag must also show the price at which the car is being offered for sale.

TOO MUCH "BRASS"
According to the Senate Preparedness subcommittee, on last September 30, there were 261 general and flag officers and 91,081 defense civilians stationed in the Washington area, slightly less than the number in Washington on April 30, 1946, just before the end of the war in Europe.

TAXES
For the fiscal year of 1952, ending next June 30, including new taxes just imposed, the rate of tax load to the highest national income earner expected, expected to total 22 1/2 billions, will reach a new peak of 64 billions, or 29.4 per cent. That amounts to \$1 out of every \$3.40 earned. The previous high was 29.3 per cent when the tax load was \$56 1/2 billions out of an income of 192 1/2 billions.

Sunnyside, Wash.—A panel discussion during an assembly at the Sunnyside High School had to be halted by school officials when the panel members "became too noisy and uncontrolled." The discussion topic was "Courtesy and manners."

END LEE WORTH BRASS
Cleveland, Ohio, in 1928, while employed by the Brasserie Lipp and Ohio Brass Co. Brasserie Lipp was the last highest brass and was awarded \$1,976. 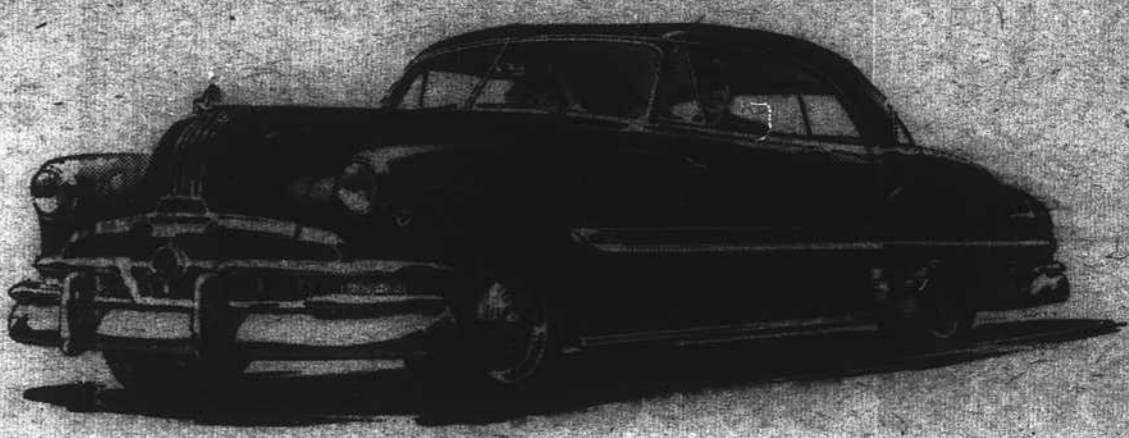
WITH DIVORCE SUIT
