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Saturday Marks Opening Day for Vote Registration

Registration for the Democratic primary on Saturday, May 31, will begin tomorrow (Saturday) and will continue for two weeks, ending at sunset on Saturday, May 17.

In compliance with laws governing the registration of new voters, Registrar J. B. Joyner will have the books for Farmville township at the police office in the Town Hall tomorrow from 9 o'clock until sunset, and on each of the two succeeding Saturdays. On other days during the registration period, voters may get their names on the books by getting in touch with Mr. Joyner, as he puts it, "wherever they find me."

Since no new registration has been ordered, the only persons required to register with Mr. Joyner will be those who have not voted in a primary or general election before in this township, who have become eligible since the last election and who will become eligible before the general election in November. Those who participated in a general election in Farmville precinct are not required to re-register. Attention is called to the fact, however, that different registration books are kept for town elections, and that some citizens registered for the town elections a year ago whose names are not on the general book. It is necessary that any who fall in this class must register with Mr. Joyner if they desire to take part in the voting on May 31, or in the general election in November.

Persons seeking to register and vote in the primary or general election must have the following qualifications:

Be a citizen of the United States.

Be at least 21 years of age, or will become 21 by the date of the general election, November 4, 1952.

Be a member in good faith of the party in whose primary he seeks to vote. This applies only to the primaries.

Show that he has not been convicted, or confessed his guilt in open court, upon indictment, of any crime the punishment of which is imprisonment in the State's prison.

Must have been a resident of the State for one year and in the precinct in which he offers to register for four months preceding the general election. The law provides that removal from one precinct to another does not deprive a voter of his right to vote in the precinct from which he has moved until four months after his removal.

Citizens are reminded of the importance of registering during the period specified. The only way a person can register after the books are closed is to present satisfactory evidence to the registrar and judges of elections when he comes to vote that he has become qualified to register and vote since the registration period expired. For example, he can show that he has acquired proper residence qualifications since the book was closed.

Mr. Burch has an outstanding record of community service. Besides his Legion duties he is an active member of the Men's Club of Walstonburg. For the past two years he has served as president of the Walstonburg School Parent-Teacher Association and has been senior valedictorian of the school since it was organized in 1949.
