New rates: \$6.50, \$7.75, \$7.25, and \$5.25 for business service and \$4, \$3.50, \$3 and \$3 for residential service.

Kindergarten Is Discussed at May Fellowship Day

Mrs. Sam Houtt of Goldsboro was the guest speaker at the May Fellowship Day meeting Thursday of last week. The annual union meeting of the church women of the community is sponsored by the Council of Church women and was held in the Episcopal Parish House beginning with a covered dish luncheon at noon. The women of the Christian Church were in charge of the program.

The theme for the day's meeting, "Spiritual Security for Today's Families," was expressed in the main address by Mrs. Houtt and in the devotional part of the service by Mrs. Chery Easley of the Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Easley read the 27th Psalm and closed her remarks with, "Spiritual strength is rooted in Christian homes with lives dedicated to God."

Mrs. W. A. Follard, Jr., led in singing the doxology and a hymn, "Come Thou Almighty King." Mrs. H. D. Moye gave the invocation. Miss Helen Smith, president of the council, opened the meeting and turned the program over to Mrs. Lloyd Smith, president of the Christian Women's Fellowship. Mrs. Smith introduced Mrs. Houtt, a director of the Protestant Kindergarten in Goldsboro. Mrs. Smith explained that Mrs. Houtt had been asked to give the background and the structural functioning process of the Goldsboro kindergarten because the Junior Woman's Club had sought the aid of the churches and civic organizations in making the kindergarten and nursery they sponsor an accredited school.

Mrs. Houtt stated that the Protestant Kindergarten in Goldsboro originated in a kindergarten sponsored by the Baptist Church in that city. When the scope of their undertaking became too large for the one church, it sought the aid of other Protestant churches.

The speaker dealt mainly with facts and figures, giving detailed information about fees, teacher's salaries, budget for the over-all set-up, the work carried on, equipment and goals.

She related that a board of directors composed of one lay member from each church and the minister of each church, directed the Kindergarten and First Grade project. The churches support the kindergarten on a percentage basis of church membership. The school has three certified teachers and is held in the Baptist church. Rent is paid for the use of the building.

In a handbook prepared by the Goldsboro teachers, a thought is expressed that epitomizes the Junior Woman's Club work, their desire, and the desire of other women, particularly church women, in seeking to improve the Nursery and Kindergarten project. The thought is this: "Little children are very important people. Their introduction to school and their development in the early years of school attendance have profound and lasting effects."
