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Henry Tyson To Retire June 30 As Rural Carrier

Completes 31 Years' Service On Farmville Routes; Ed Nash Warren Takes Over Rural Post

Henry Tyson's retirement as rural mail carrier on June 30, after more than 31 years of service, will result in several major personnel changes in the Farmville postoffice.

Archie Cayton, who has been serv ing as carrier on route 1 since Joe Henry Bynum's retirement several years ago, will take over Mr. Tyson's route, number 2. Ed Nash Warren, a clerk in the post office for 14 years, will shift to the position of rural carrier and will take over the Cayton route. These changes will become effective at the same time.

Mr. Tyson rounded out 31 years service as a carrier in April. He has faithfully served the rural inhabitants on Farmville routes. Of his total service, 28 years and three months were spent as rural carrier on route 1, and the remainder of the time three years, as route 2's carrier.
