

185 pints of blood were given in a recent visit to Greenville, the highest in this county so far. Dr. Smith says that 200 to 250 donors are needed to meet the 150 pint quota for Farm-

According to Dr. J. M. Mewborn, hairman of the County Medical lociety's blood bank committee, the blood bank has worked successfully as far as being used by those who have needed it. In the Farmville , area around 25 persons have used blood from the bank since the first visit of the bloodmobile here.

The blood program has not met its quots in Pitt County although Green-ville and Farmville have. 60 percent of the blood donated in the bloodmobile drives is retained by the local blood bank; 40 per cent is used by the Armed Forces of our country.

His report showed that for the first five sales days last year Farm-ville's seven warehouses sold 1,508,-818 poinds for an average of \$49.60. In the first five days this year, the market sold 1,498,912 poinds for an average of \$52.07. He states that these are official figures.

Farmville's opening day average, 53.55, was the highest reported in the Eastern Belt. Last year's opening sale averaged \$51.15 for 459,218 pounds. The opening sales Thursday were 691,682 pounds,

Sales since opening have been c aratively light. Heavier offeri were reported on yesterday's sa and a full sales is expected for tod Some lugs, but mostly tips, have offered this week.

Labor Day will be observed as a oliday for the market. However re expects that full sales held beginning with Tuesday, and that better quality of tobacco will also be offered. This means a still

better report for the market. The Stabilization Corporat received about five percent of the total tobacco sold here this week, which is well below the average for the helt.

Moore states that only one market in the Eastern Belt has an average higher than Farmville.
