

CONGRESSIONAL RACE IN THIRD HOLDS CENTER OF STATE POLITICAL STAGE

Free, to date, from enough mud slinging to check the interest of those who disdain the lower order of politics, the pre-primary fight has been, and will continue to be, hard fought.

Nine actual working days remain before the first test of strength and after the leading candidate and the runner up have been picked, supporters of five candidates now in the race will be picking other favorites.

SOLICITORSHIP WARMING UP Not alone is Wayne engaged in a heated Congressional fight but within the last few days the race between Claxson L. Williams of Sanford, and Solicitor Walter D. Siler has warmed up to the point where the county's vote is anybody's.

Within the past week, too, the voters of the county and of the entire district have—more or less unconsciously—realized that A. C. Avery of Morganton, in running for Congress, and Commissioner W. T. Lee. This is the only state wide contest the voters will participate in June third but it promises to afford plenty of thrills.

A second primary is as freely predicted in the judicial contest in the sixth district as in the Third Congressional.

Sampson is offering Henry A. Grady and Henry E. Faison, both Democrats rare horses, while Duplin is presenting the names of Henry L. Stevens and George Ward. Lenoir is offering Guy C. Moore, editor-lawyer.

COUNTY FIGHTS OF INTEREST Reams might be written about the various county fights in the district, some of which are spectacular. But it remains for a fact, questionnaires notwithstanding, that the campaign for county officers is still in the personal stage and few issues interest voters supporting their favorites.

By no means is the campaign in the Third District, even if it is the year in politics. State attention is riveted on the Congressional contest and politics is being played within politics.
