50 WOMEN PRISONERS IN MAY MAKES RECORD AT BEDFORD

Bedford, June 2.—Major Amos T. Baker, Superintendent of the State Reformatory for Women here, announced today that fifty new "offenders" were admitted this month, making a new high record. The crime wave, according to reformatory attaches, is increasing among women. The fiftieth prisoner of the month arrived today from the Tombs in Manhattan. Since Major Baker took charge, more than a year ago, the largest previous record for one month was thirty-three new arrivals, last February.

The reformatory prisoners attended brief Memorial Day exercises. Major Baker, a World War veteran, presided and spoke briefly. There was patriotic music and the prisoners sang.
