### THIS IS CLEAN-UP WEEK.

The civic department of the Women's Club is asking every house wife in Goldsboro to cooperate with the sanitary officer in the disposal of garbage and rubbish lying around in back yards. Garbage collection facilities are provided by the city. It must be borne in mind, however, that drivers of trash carts are not permitted to enter back yards; all garbage must be placed at the edge of sidewalk in a suitable container, either a galvanized can or a neatly painted wooden box. Unsightly boxes will be taken off with the trash.

On Tuesdays and Fridays trash is collected from streets running north and south. On Mondays and Thursdays trash is collected from streets running east and west.

All garbage must be out by 7:30 a. m. on the day of collection, or set out late in the afternoon of the previous day.

The man with imagination is equal to all emergencies; for when one way of accomplishing a desired result proves inefficient he will think of another.

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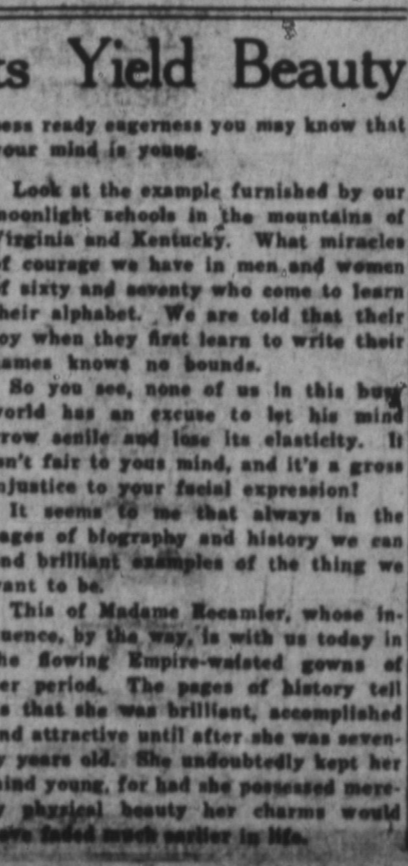
