### Austrian Medium, 18 Years Old, Startles European Scientists

**Produces Most Remarkable Phenomena While Sewed Up in Black Tights Striped With Luminous Matter, With His Hands and Feet Securely Held**

Willie Schneider, the eighteen-year-old Austrian spirit medium who is said to produce phenomena more startling than any in the annals of psychical research, under test conditions more rigid than those heretofore imposed on mediums, is now baffling Europe's most scientific investigators and scientists, according to an advance publication of the proceedings of the British Society for Psychical Research.

Dr. Eric Dingwall, of New York, research officer for the society and known as one of the skeptical and keen investigators acquainted with nearly all the tricks employed by mediums, reporting a sitting with Schneider last May in Munich, Germany, in the laboratory of Baron von Schrenck-Notzing, said that "held as he was, no one could possibly produce such phenomena normally."

In the presence of 27 German university professors, eighteen doctors and sixteen other savants, according to Dr. Dingwall's report, the youth was first stripped and sewn up in black tights covered with luminous stripes. Then, while his hands, wrists and legs were tightly held, a table some six feet away covered by a gauze frame was elevated several feet in the air, bells were rung, loud knocks were heard and other extraordinary physical phenomena were produced in a bright red light.

The doctor went on to describe other experiments which, under conditions imposed by the sitters, could not have been done by trickery.

So far not one of the hundreds who have witnessed the boy's seances have offered any solution. The report is filled with sworn testimonials that at least he is not a fraud, from several professional magicians and scientists who formerly pronounced all mediums either conscious or unconscious tricksters.

Dr. Carrington, who gave the story exclusively to The World, said that during his recent European tour to study psychic conditions abroad, Willie Schneider was the object of more attention and discussion among foreign investigators than any other medium of any time.

Schneider was born in Austria and at present is a dentist's apprentice in Germany. He is said to lose consciousness completely at the beginning of the seances.

Jerseyman Offers to "Work Either Rope or Electricity."

TRENTON, Nov. 9.—William S. Gilbert, a physician, of 106 Fountain avenue, has ambitions to become an official executioner, believing it to be a "profession that offers splendid opportunities for financial remuneration," even though it may not be the most congenial sort of an occupation.

Gilbert has had professional cards printed and is also placing in circulation lead pencils bearing his advertisement. He has written the wardens and principal keepers of penitentiaries throughout the East, applying for appointment as official executioner and quoting his rates, also setting forth his readiness to "work with either rope or electricity."

In his letter to the keeper at Sing Sing, Gilbert quoted a rate of \$5175 for a single or double execution, "while in West Virginia he asks \$175 each. The cheaper rate for New York, he said, he gives "because of the larger number of executions that take place there."
