Eminent 19th Baidle Herd.
The work of eminent 19th in the 20th legible herd and also in the one owned by the experiment station shows a striking influence of the effect of a good bull through one or two generations. An examination of the official records made by daughters of Eminent 19th from register of merit cows shows that at an average age of three years and three months, these daughters produced 8472 pounds of milk and 137.27 pounds of fat. The dams of these Eminent-bred heifers produced as mature cows 7893 pounds of milk and 388.71 pounds of fat. Considering age, this is an increase of approximately 55 per cent due to the use of a prepotent sire. This increase is a little less than some other instances cited. However, it is work done with cows of more than average production, and with register of merit cows. The greater the production, the more difficult it is to increase the production by breeding.
