# ALIEN SMUGGLING TRIAL NEAR END AT PENSACOLA

PENSACOLA, Fla., Nov. 23.—The trial of Captain Benjamin Edmundson, alleged operator of Pensacola, and Louis Yon, alias Quam Yick, of Philadelphia, charged with smuggling aliens into the United States from Cuba, probably will be concluded tomorrow in the United States district court here.

The defendant's trial was begun yesterday after C. P. Moore, owner of the auxiliary schooner Spences, and another party to have been the ringleader in the conspiracy, and four others pleaded guilty.

The government backed up its contention of having apprehended one of the most systematic organizations for smuggling Chinese aliens into the United States by using as a witness D. M. Richards, alias D. M. Richardson, who testified he was a traveling agent in the business of arranging to bring human cargoes. He said he collected \$300 per head for the first lots of Chinese smuggled into this country from Cuba after they had been observed by him to leave Yick's place in Philadelphia.

The schooner Spences was used to carry the Chinese from Cuba to a certain point off the Florida coast, which according to the testimony of C. B. Lounsbury and Don Atwell, who claimed to have been in the employ of Captain Edmundson, they used one of Edmundson's fast boats to transfer the aliens from the schooner to land.

# PILING SOUND ENDS LIFE OF VALERA'S CHIEF LIEUTENANT

## Emilio Childers Executed For Having Hidden an Automatic Pistol in His Possession

### FATE HANGING IN THE BALANCE FOR DAYS

DUBLIN, Nov. 23.—By the Associated Press. Emilio Childers, chief lieutenant of Emilio de Valera, was executed today.

He was executed at seven o'clock this morning for having hidden an automatic pistol in his possession. It was reported that he had hidden the pistol in a trunk which he carried on his back.

Childers was tried by a military court at Dublin on charges of treason and of having hidden the pistol in his possession.

The military court found Childers guilty and sentenced him to death. The sentence was carried out this morning.

The method of execution was not officially described but it is believed it was by shooting.

The fate of Childers has been hanging in the balance for several days, while court sessions were being fought over his military trial, but with the adverse finding by the military court regarding his involvement in the murder of Michael Mallin, it was believed that his execution would be the next logical step.

Childers was a member of the Irish Republican army and was one of the most prominent military leaders in Dublin on November 17 on the charges that he had a pistol hidden in his possession.

Childers was captured on the morning of November 16 at the home of a relative, Robert Barton, situated in a wooded and picturesque section of Wicklow. Two columns of National troops surrounded the Barton house at dawn. One of the soldiers rapped on the door and was answered by a maid.

The servant was thrust aside and a detachment of the expedition entered the house.

Childers was found in an upstairs bedroom. He attempted to draw a pistol but was overpowered. He was taken to Wicklow jail, and later to the barracks in Dublin.

Robert Barton, one of the signatories of the Anglo-Irish treaty, later turned against it.

Smoot said, was to provide a few months of home leave for the while through "that had stood the fire for years until America could come, and were rather exhausted."

"We couldn't foresee," he said, "that it would be more objectionable to the Germans than to the French in whose towns they had been garrisoned. When we learned that it was, they were withdrawn."

"The German objection was more of a surprise because they employed black troops, and if they did not bring them to the front it was because no more of them were to be found. They did not intend to invade Belgium with blacks."

Then the Tiger came to Senator Hobbs' statement that he, Obeyesekere, was responsible for most of Europe's troubles, because of the treaty of Versailles. He stated that the treaty was not only the opposite to his own policy, but was the cause of the world's trouble.

"Let those who say I asked to march to Europe—let them bring their German friends, and let us settle it there where it can be seen."
