"The most phenomenal forward-passing I ever witnessed!" was the conclusion of Col. George K. Freeman and other Goldsboro men who saw Carlina's wonder-team break down traditions of a decade or more and crush Virginia on her home grounds.

Colonel Freeman described them as

DENMARK REPORTS ON DISPATCH IN REMABILITATION NEW BERN'S DESTITUTE PEOPLE

Work of feeding, housing and clothing the destitute of New Bern was proceeding with memarkable precision through the quick functioning of organizations, it was stated by W. C. Denmark in a long distance communication from New Bern at midnight, Captain Edwin Michaux, of Battery 'A' of this city, shipped a number of army cots on the night train which were expected to reach New Bern before morning.

Secretary Denmark called attention to the fact that all of the clothing gathered by the Goldsboro Woman's Club was gathered an incredible short time, and that it was all first-class stuff, being clothes taken from the laundry and suits secured from pressing clubs. Seven cases of clothes were secured at once.

Most of those destitute were negroes, Mr. Denmark said, and many of them were being housed and fed in the colored graded school. There were Red Cross workers and other organizations on hand, and the dispatch with which they and the chamber of commence /was functioning was pointed out as one of the outstanding features of
