The steering committee of the executive committee for the coming campaign for the community memorial building met yesterday afternoon with the chairman of the executive committee, Loyal Well to further outline plans for the coming drive for funds. These same citizens state that they feel also a need for a real memorial to the boys who died.

FIVE FIRES OCCUR IN GOLDSBORO IN THE MONTH OF MAY

High Point Leads State in Fire Loss With Charlotte Having Nineteen Blazes

RALEIGH, N. C., June 16.—Charlotte led the list of cities in the number of fires during May, but High Point suffered the heaviest monetary loss as nineteen fires occurred in Charlotte while only one occurred in High Point, that one causing a loss of \$195,268, according to the fire loss report of Insurance Commissioner Wade which was issued here today.

LOSS FOR MONTH OVER HALF MILLION

Single fires of 5,000 and over, says the report, were as follows: High Point furniture factory and contents, \$195,268; Bensford, a foreign yacht, \$50,000; Salisbury factory and dwellings, \$35,000; Greensboro, colored school building, \$16,500; Greensboro, bottling plant and garage, \$22,900; Spring Hope, tobacco warehouse, \$14,500; Winston, warehouse and storage, \$14,000; Winston, dwelling, \$14,500; Winston, warehouse and storage, \$14,000; Winston, Salem, dwelling, \$14,000; Oaslon, \$14,000.
