INSULIN DISCOVERY TO ASSIST IN THE TUBERCULOSIS FIGHT

So Says Eminent Physician Speaking Before Santa Barbara Meeting

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., June 21.—(By Athle associated Press)—"The discovery of insulin for the cure of diabetes by Dr. F. G. Banting of Toronto, Canada, may be considered a great aid in the anti-tuberculosis campaign," said Dr. W. D. Sansum of Potter Metabolic Clinic, Santa Barbara, Cal., today at the nineteenth annual meeting of the National Tuberculosis Association now in session in this city.

WILL ENABLE PROPER FEEDING

The use of insulin, Doctor Sansum pointed out, now frees such patients from all diabetic symptoms, and if tuberculosis is present this may be treated with the best general diet that the market affords. One patient under the care of Dr. Sansum gained 25 pounds, an drow weighs 15 pounds more than he ever weighed. In every one of his tuberculosis diabetic cases, laboratory findings have shown progressive improvement. "It now appears," said Dr. Sansum, "that such recovery as have similar patients with patients have the same chance of re- out diabetes."

"HELLO THERE" IS PRESIDENT'S FIRST SPEECH ON HIS TRIP

Little Boy Hails the Chief Executive and Gets a Cheerful Reply. The speaker ascribed the rapid growth of insurance after the Civil War to the migration into the Mesopotamian Valley which occurred about 1870. He said that the cheap frame buildings constructed in that section made insurance necessary and that many companies with no particular strength made enormous profits until the Chicago fire when a large number of them failed. PUMP INSTALLED The installation of a water pump in the rear of the Serve-U Market, of which M. J. H. Payne is proprietor, was completed yesterday. The machine pumps water from an artesian well forty feet deep. The water pumped by the machine is used for the refrigerating plant, which eliminates the use of city water.
