Second: Payment of dividends, which amounted to over \$100,000. Third, had accounts. Fourth, overhead expenses. Fifth, purchase of the Florida Soft Acid Phosphate mines. Sixth, tremendous cost of the plants. They were built when material was at its highest. Seventh, depreciation during the financial slump. Eighth, mistakes and errors of judgment of officers.
