For many years senior radiographer at the London Hospital, Mr. Blackall is a victim of X-ray dermatitis (inflammation which destroys the skin as a result of his constant exposure to the rays. In the early part of this year he had to have his left hand removed, and recently his right hand. Only forty years of age he is virtually at the end of what was promised to be an unusually brilliant career. For two years now he has been unable to carry on any active work, but he still acts in an advisory capacity to the hospital.

NOTICE OF NEW REGISTRATION FOR ELECTION CALLED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF WAYNE COUNTY TO BE HELD ON THE PROPOSITION OF THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SPECIAL SCHOOL TAXING DISTRICTS ENBRACING ALL SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN THE ENTIRE COUNTY OF WAYNE EXCEPT THE TERRITORY ENBRACED IN THE THREE SPECIAL CHARTERED DISTRICTS OF FREMONT, GOLDSBORO AND MOUNT OLIVE, AND THE LEVYING OF A SPECIAL TAX NOT EXCEEDING THIRTY CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION OF ALL PROPERTY REAL AND PERSONAL IN SAID DISTRICT TO SUPPLEMENT THE SCHOOL FUND AND TO EQUALIZE SCHOOL ADVANTAGES THEREIN.

Whereas, an election has been called by the Board of County Commissioners of Wayne County to be held on the 20th day of November, 1923, to determine whether the qualified voters in the District hereinafter described approve and authorize the establishment of a Special School Taxing District comprising:

The entire County of Wayne embracing all of the School District therein except the territory embraced in the three Special Chartered Districts of Fremont, Goldsboro, and Mount Olive.

And to determine whether the qualified voters of said District approve and authorize the levy of a Special Annual Tax of not exceeding Thirty Cents on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all property, real and personal, in said District in addition to the County tax for the six months School term to supplement the School fund and to equalize school advantages within the Special School Taxing District;

And Whereas, a new registration of the qualified voters of the said territory embraced in the said District is required under the Statute for the purpose of said election and notice of said new registration is required to be published in some newspaper published or circulated in said District at least thirty days before the close of the registration books;

And Whereas, said new registration has been duly ordered and the order thereof entered upon the Minutes of the Board of County Commissioners of Wayne County;

Now, Therefore, notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the territory embraced in said District that a new registration of the voters within said District for the purpose of said election shall be held and the registration books for said election shall be open for the registration of all voters in said District on the 15th day of October, 1923, and shall remain open (Sundays excepted) on each day thereafter until 5 o'clock P. M. on Saturday the 10th day of November, 1923, at which time the said registration books shall be closed. The time for the opening of said registration books shall be 9 o'clock A. M. and the time for closing of the same shall be 5 o'clock P. M. provided however, that during the last three days of the period of registration each registrar hereinafter designated for the registration shall attend with his registration book the polling place of his precinct hereinafter designated for the registration of voters.

It shall be the duty of each registrar to attend the polling place of his precinct with the registration books on the Saturday preceding the election from the hour of 9 A. M. until the hour of 3 o'clock P. M., when and where the said books shall be open for the inspection of the electors of the precinct or Township and any of said electors shall be allowed to object to the name of any person appearing on said books. In case of any such objection the registrar shall enter upon his books opposite the name of the person so objected to, the word "challenged," and shall appoint a time and place before the election, day when he, together with the said Judges of Election, shall hear and decide said objection giving personal notice of such challenge to the voter so objected to, and if for any cause personal notice cannot be given, then it shall be sufficient notice to leave a copy thereof at his residence; provided nothing in this Section shall prohibit any elector from challenging or objecting to the name of any person registered or offering to register at any time other than that above specified. If any person challenged or objected to shall be found not duly qualified, the registrar shall erase his name from the books. The rules governing the hearing of challenges set out in Sections 5973 and 5974, Consolidated Statutes, shall be the rules governing the hearings upon challenges in this registration and election.

Voting Precincts.

For the purpose of this registration and election said Special School Taxing District is divided into the following voting precincts, to-wit:

Great Swamp Township; Saulston Township; New Hope Township; Pikeville Township; Fork Township; Grantham Township; Stoney Creek Township; Buck Swamp Township; Dudley Precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing general elections; providence precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing elections Mount Olive precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing elections, except portion thereof as is embraced in the Mount Olive Special Chartered District; Eureka precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing general elections; Nahantua precinct, No. 1, comprising the territory embraced in Nahantua Township, except Eureka precinct and the territory embraced in the Fremont Special Chartered District; Indian Springs precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing general elections; White Hall precinct, as defined and bounded under the rules and law governing general elections.

The polls will open on election day at sunrise and close at sunset.

Leave Of Absence
Granted Teachers

(Special to The News.)
 Trinity College, Durham, Sept. 26.—A committee of the Trinity College faculty during the year passed made a special study of leaves of absence to be granted to those members of the faculty who wish to pursue their own studies or to perform some special work elsewhere in America and Europe. The substance of this report was that sabbatical leaves should be granted to those faculty members according to seniority of service, one year's leave to be granted on half salary or a half year's leave on full salary. These leaves are a privilege of the college professors once every seven years, the proviso being that any member of the faculty shall have been in the employment of the college at least six years.

Taking advantage of these leaves this year, R. A. S. Webb, Professor of Romance languages is studying French at Sorbonne University, Paris; R. N. Wilson, Professor of Chemistry, is preparing for extension work for the college at the University of Illinois; and Dr. W. H. Classon, head of the department of Political Science, will leave during the Spring term to specialize in the subject of Economics at Yale University for half a year, and Prof. Wilson for a full year. Dr. Classon will be on leave for half a year.
