WINS BY STENDEL WINS FIRST GAME FROM THE YANKEES

N. Y. National League Team Defeats Americans by Score of 5 to 4

ONE RUN IN NINTH WON FOR M'GRAWMEN

(By the Associated Press.) New York, Oct. 10.—Swinging his bat in that fabled setting of the diamond in the ninth inning, with the score tied, two out and the count "two and three" Casey Stengel blasted his way into baseball's hall of fame today with a home run...

Crashed to the extreme right center field of the Yankee Stadium, that smash broke the heart of Joe Bush, forked ball star, who had held the Giants in check after seeing his team batter Walter Hoyt from the mound...

A vast throng of 55,000 which shattered all records for World's series attendance and filled close to its capacity the great stadium, witnessed the third successive struggle between New York's rival clubs for premier honors of the diamond.

That colorful gathering of fan from all walks of life and all parts of the country, was wrought to frenzied pitch of excitement as it unfolded one of the episodes of the same. It saw the Yankees smarting from the memory of having been beaten for two straight years by their National League opponent, rush spectacularly to the front in the first two innings, only to be overhauled by a sensational rally, a masterpiece of strategic attack that gave the World's Champions four runs and the lead in the fourth inning...

The attendance eclipsed by more than 12,000 the highest previous record while the gate receipts of practically \$182,000 surpassed the old record by more than \$50,000.

THE FIELD TO KERR ALLSBROOK LEAVES

(By the Associated Press.) Raleigh, Oct. 10.—Richard G. Allsbrook of Tarboro, N. C., in a statement tonight to The Raleigh News and Observer announced his withdrawal from the Congressional race in the Second District to select a successor to the late Claude Kitchin, leaving Judge John H. Kerr, of Warrenton, N. C., as the undisputed winner of the nomination on the Democratic ticket.

Judge Kerr led Mr. Allsbrook in Saturday's primary by about 2,000 votes. Had Mr. Allsbrook not withdrawn a second primary would have been necessary as Judge Kerr lacked a majority of the total votes cast. Nomination in the Second District on the Democratic ticket is equivalent to election, as the Republicans are weak in the district.

Senator Couzens Back From Europe Wants Volstead Law Modified

RECEIVERSHIP FOR GERMANY HIS IDEA

(By the Associated Press.) New York, Oct. 10.—Receivership for Germany, a more sympathetic interest in European affairs by America and a modification of the Volstead act to allow five per cent alcohol content were some of the recommendations voiced by Senator Couzens of Michigan, who returned today from a tour of Europe.

He said he believed Henry Ford would be elected president if he were nominated by any of the recognized parties but did not hazard a guess as to Ford's chances of obtaining the nomination.

The Senator said his study of conditions in Germany had convinced him that the only solution would be receivership for Germany.

"It is perfectly ridiculous for the great United States," he said, "to stand aside without even having an opinion. America should take a sympathetic interest without entering the world court."

While expressing sympathy with France in her effort to get back something for war damage, Senator Couzens said he was more in favor of any plan which would relieve the present intolerable condition of the masses in Germany.

Threat of Flood In Florida Ceases

(By the Associated Press.) Moorehaven, Fla., Oct. 10.—Residents of Moorehaven which was flooded during yesterday when the waters of Lake Okechobee broke through the dykes surrounding the town felt a measure of relief early today when it was indicated that the crest of the high water had been reached barring the possibility of another heavy Northeast wind.

Moorehaven and the surrounding country tonight remained inundated to an average depth of 2 inches with heavy loss to livestock and property. No effort has been made to estimate the damage. There has been no loss of life.

OLDER PEOPLE OF STATE ARE AGAIN BACK IN SCHOOLS

Extension Service of University Will be Great Thing for North Carolina

GROUPS IN DOZEN TOWNS ARE ACTIVE

(By the Associated Press.) Chapel Hill, Oct. 10.—The "Townships"—heads of families as well as business, spinsters as well as mothers—in brief, the older folk of the State are going to school again, many of them to earn a college diploma. They begin this month when the Extension Division of the University of North Carolina, of which Chester D. Small is director, puts into effect its recently announced program of conducting classes all over the State and giving credit toward degrees for work satisfactorily completed.

Begin This Week

Already groups of citizens in more than a dozen towns have made arrangements for courses, some of which begin this week. Classes conducted by University professors first they are at Chapel Hill, only not so frequently will be held wherever as many as 15 persons want a course. The town in which arrangements have been completed for courses to begin this month include Raleigh, Greensboro, Durham, High Point, Statesville, Salisbury, Burlington, Sanford, Oxford and Lexington.

Great Demands

Professor George H. Zehmer, who during the past summer was added to the staff of the Extension Division, is organizing this state class work as head of the department of extension teaching. He has recently returned from a visit to the towns mentioned and reports a great demand for courses.

In Raleigh John Boushel is organizing a course for bankers, to be taught by Professor C. T. Murchison, of the chair of applied economics. Wingate Jones is organizing a similar course in Durham.

Courses in sociology will be given in Durham, Burlington and Oxford under the direction of Dr. Howard W. Odum, director of the school of Public Welfare, assisted by Dr. Harold D. Meyer, associate professor of sociology, and Dr. Jesse F. Steiner, professor of social technology.

Courses in Greensboro

In Greensboro there will be courses in advertising and salesmanship by Professor Charles H. Fernald; courses in education by Dr. Ar. Humphrey.

Guests of Kiwanis. The distinguished guests, consisting of National Councilor Tunkson of New York, Vice National Councilor, Walters of Pennsylvania, Chairman Noyes of the Immigration Commission of Washington and Chairman Cooper of the State Committee of Raleigh, will motor through to Goldsboro this morning, reaching the city at 10 a. m., or shortly before that hour. Representative business men of the city will meet and greet the visitors at the Hotel Kennon at 10 o'clock and the delegates will be carried to inspect three of the six sites on which options have been secured here. That will consume the greater part of the morning.

The Kiwanis Club, in a body, together with a number of invited representative citizens, will then, hopefully, with the National Councilor. This will take place at the Woman's Club and covers will be laid for the luncheon according to an announcement made last night. The program for the luncheon will be enjoyable, there being a musical number provided and five tribute addresses by Colonel Jos. E. Robinson, Dr. W. O. Cone and George K. Freeman. Other features will also be provided and it is expected that this will constitute one of the most delightful features of the day.

Executive Session. Following the conclusion of the luncheon the National Committee, together with the members of the local committee will go into executive session in the Old Fellows Home. The local committee taking part in this executive session will consist of U. E. Gillikin, George Spence, E. L. Edmondson, Dr. A. G. Woodard and Charles Dewey, and among those who will appear and speak briefly before the executive session will be President John Hawley, of the Goldsboro Chamber of Commerce, Kenneth S. Royall, Archie Dees and George F. Hood.

One Out of Fourteen. It is confidently believed here that after the National representative hear Goldsboro's claims advanced, this city will stand a splendid show to secure the orphanage, which institution for the State of North Carolina has already been authorized by the National Council. However, it should be taken into consideration that the committee now inspecting sites in North Carolina will visit a total of 14 cities and towns in the State before compiling their final conclusions on the matter and Goldsboro's chances are therefore at a probable ratio of about 10 to 1. However, utmost confidence was prevailing in the city last night that Goldsboro has a splendid show to finally win out.

Ask Citizens' Aid. The entire public of the city is requested to give such aid as may lay in its power today in creating the innumerable advantages which Goldsboro has to offer and it is hoped that this city and this section should make a very deep impression upon the guests who are here for the day. If trying will secure the branch orphanage for Goldsboro, it is as good as located here, asserted those last night who were making final plans for carrying today's program through to a successful conclusion.
