Given Extra Constitutional Authority to Deal With Economic Situation

(By the Associated Press.) Berlin, Oct. 13.—The Reichstag today adopted the emergency bill, giving Chancellor Stressemann evtra constitutional authority to deal with the grave economic situation in Germany as he sees fit. It was uncertain until the last moment which way the voting would go, but the coalition parties turned out in full strength and the Chancellor held over the house the alternative of dissolution if it did not support the measure.

The result of the vote was received with applause, except among the Communists who booed and hissed.

Threatening Fire At Last Controlled

(By the Associated Pres.) Passadena, Calif., Oct. 13 .-- A forest and brush fire which for a time today threatened four or five commu-nities in this section was brought un-der control tonight. Residences in the outskirts of several mail towns were burned when the flames fanned by a high wind, swept over several thousand acres in, a few hours.

Hundreds of men were thrown into a line established in Sycamore Canyon to battle the blaze and late this afternoon, as the breeze died down, a numbr of trees in the path of the fire were dynamited.
