STRESEMANN MADE VIRTUAL DICTATOR BY THE REICHSTAG

Given Extra Constitutional Authority to Deal With Economic Situation (By the Associated Press.) Berlin, Oct. 13.—The Reichstag today adopted the emergency bill, giving Chancellor Stresemann extra constitutional authority to deal with the grave economic situation in Germany as he sees fit. It was uncertain until the last moment which way the voting would go, but the coalition parties turned out with full strength and the Chancellor held over the house the alternative of dissolution if it did not support the measure.

ASKING EFFECTIVE PROHIBITION LAWS Seek to Have American People Carry on in Fight for Dry Country

(By the Associated Press.) Washington, Oct. 13.—Appeals to the American people to carry on in the fight for prohibition were made today in opening sessions of the Citizen Conference, called to promote law observance. Prominent spokesmen of religious, temperance, civic, political and other organizations urged a reverse of the movement which led to the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment. Resolutions designed to make the prohibition laws more effective were adopted and these will be presented to the delegates for use in local organizations before the close of the conference.

(By the Associated Press.) Booneville, Mo., Oct. 13.—Asserting that he was offered \$1,000 to go to New York as witness for W. E. D. Stokes, millionaire hotel owner, in the Stokes divorce case, was made in deposition by Hayden Moore, a grocer of Bunceon, Mo. Moore declared he received a letter last July from a representative of Stokes, making this offer, adding he had been told Stokes would pay him \$125 a month to look after the case. He declined "offers" he testified.

TAR HEEL STATERS BEST SANDLAPPERS BY ONE TOUCHDOWN

N. C. State Defeats University of South Carolina by Score of 7 to 0

RALEIGH, Oct. 13.—By a score of 7 to 0, North Carolina State defeated the University of South Carolina eleven on Riddick Field here this afternoon in a game which was far more bitterly contested than State had anticipated it would be. The game opened with South Carolina kicking off. Shufford received and made 25 yards for N. C. State. Play stayed in the middle of the field most of the quarter. Making four first downs, N. C. State outplayed South Carolina which made only one first down. N. C. State completed one forward pass, netting 25 yards, Lassiter to Crater. Carolina's line held strong on its 25 yard line. The quarter ended just as Boatwright, Carolina, intercepted a State pass. Three thousand persons were assembled to witness the game.

The first half of the game ended with the score still 0 to 0. The quarter opened with Carolina punting. Both teams held well during the period, each unable to break the others line, they both resorted to punting for gaining ground. N. C. State penalized 15 yards for holding. Passes by both teams failed, they not being completed. Lassiter tried to score for State with a drop kick, but he was unsuccessful. The half ended with the ball in Carolina's possession on her own 29 yard line. State made one first down, while Carolina made none.

The third quarter ended with State 7 to Carolina 0. South Carolina opened the last half with the kickoff to State. Johnson, for State returning the ball to midfield. Three tries at the line failing. Elms punted to Carolina's 30 yard line. Boatwright made nine yards, South Carolina fumbled and the ball was State's on the 50 yard line. Line plays unavailing and Elms punted, the receiving being downed on the 15 yard line. The visitors punted to State's 25 yard line. Two line plays resulted in a first down. Lassiter made five yards and a penalty on South Carolina made it first down. State was thrown for a loss and then punted back to Carolina's 15 yard line. The gamecock tried two line plays, which made no gain. Wheeler then made an end run of 22 yards for South Carolina's first down. With the ball on the 42 yard line, Charlie Shufford, State, intercepted a pass and ran 55 yards for a touchdown. Lassiter kicked goal.

The game ended 7 to 0 in favor of North Carolina State. Both teams used the kick and pass during the last quarter. Carolina played a stronger game, but State was able to hold the visitors in check. Each side made one first down. The ball remained in centerfield most of the period.

Nine Feet of Water In End, Oklahoma (By the Associated Press.) End, Okla., Oct. 13.—A wall of water said to be nine feet high struck the town according to imperfect reports received by telegraph. Scores of persons are said to have been made homeless, although no lives are believed to have been lost. Extensive damage, it was said, has been caused by the flood.

Threatening Fire At Last Controlled (By the Associated Press.) Pasadena, Calif., Oct. 13.—A forest and brush fire which for a time today threatened four or five communities in this section was brought under control tonight. Residences in the outskirts of several small towns were burned when the flames fanned by a high wind, swept over several thousand acres in a few hours. Hundreds of men were thrown into a line established in Sycamore Canyon to battle the blaze and late this afternoon, as the breeze died down, a number of trees in the path of the fire were dynamited.
