The program is elaborate, covering the Cradle Roll, Primary, Intermediate, Junior, Senior Adult and the home training class of the two correlated departments.

Papers were read during the day dealing with vital issues of the work. Among which were: "How to conduct a Christian Endeavor," Prof. Aaron Brown, "How to Conduct a Sunday School," by Prof. J. W. El-needs of the child can the cradle roll department assist in meeting," by Nora Darden, "Physical equipment for a modern school," W. C. Redding.

Papers read in the administration and adult division conference were: "Methods of instruction in the Adult department," by Dr. J. E. Kennedy, Wilson, N. C. The home extension department," by Alonzo Swinson, "The Sunday School's part in the educational program of the church," by Rev. S. R. Walker, "Problems of administration and supervision," by Dr. B. P. Coward, "How can we improve the district convention," by Dr. William Sutton.

Third Annual Eastern Carolina Exposition Certainly Not Going Begging It is Said.

Kinston, Sept. 1.—If anybody thinks that the Third Annual Eastern Carolina Exposition, which will be held April 13-18 1925, will have to go begging for an invitation, he is badly mistaken. Since it was announced recently that the final date for placing the 1925 Show would be September 5th, when the regular monthly meeting of the Directors and Officers will meet, four applications have been received for this annual event. The chances are there will be at least two more applicants in before the closing date, September 2, and maybe three more. This will make the contest really interesting.

The towns that have formal applications in with the Secretary now, are Smithfield, Washington, Roanoke, Kinston, the genial hostess this year, has expressed her desire to have it again, provided it will be for the best interest of the big annual event. However Kinston is willing to step aside and let some other town have it, if it will be better for the Eastern Chamber. As a matter of fact, Kinston's first concern is in the success of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, and second her own gain, by having the Exposition.

The directors and officers of the big Chamber will be held in Kinston

Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the offices of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, to select the town where the 1925 Exposition will be held. It is quite likely that a skeleton program will be submitted to the directors for their consideration also at this meeting. A full representation is expected, on account of the interest being manifested in the third annual show.

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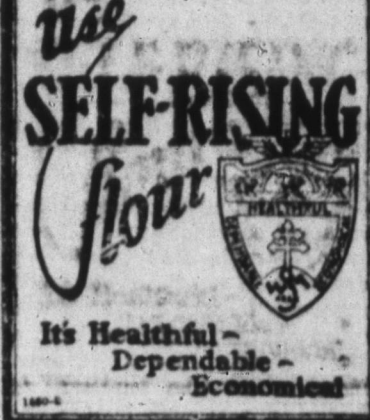
