### ANNOUNCE PROGRAM

The Home Economics Department of the Goldsboro Woman's Club offers for the coming year, during the first three weeks in November, nine lessons in Dressmaking, Costume Design, or Interior Decorating. ### PETTY GIRLS AND HANDSOME HORSES IN SPARKS CIRCUS

## RACING PROGRAM AT THE NEXT FAIR BE INTEREST

Fifty-Three Horses Have Been Entered Thus Far and It is Expected That Not Less Than Eight Fast Steeds Will be Seen in Action on the Fairs Included in the Short-Ship Circuit.

Secretaries of the Short-Ship Fair Circuit, representing Raleigh, Clinton, Fayetteville, Kinston, Rocky Mount and Goldsboro, gathered in this city yesterday afternoon, for the purpose of arranging for the racing program which is to be featured at all the fairs on the circuit.

President R. F. Jackson called the meeting to order, and stated its object, after which discussion was entered into by the members.

As a result of this, Mr. T. B. Smith, secretary, was delegated to go to Harrisburg, Va., and to Lynchburg,

Va., in the interest of the racing card, to carry along blanks, and to sign up as many horses as possible.

The first fair will be held at Rocky Mount, on September 28th, and this will be followed in rotation by Kinston, Raleigh, Fayetteville, Goldsboro, and Clinton on the short ship circuit.

Fifty-three horses have been entered on this circuit thus far, and it is expected that before the lists are closed that more than eighty horses will be included on the racing program.

## GOOD PRICES PAID FOR TOBACCO HERE

Despite Inclement Weather, Fair Sales Were Held Here on Tuesday—Farmers Pleased

Regardless of the fact that inclement weather prevented many growers from even starting to town with their weed, quite a large amount of tobacco was sold on the floors of the Goldsboro warehouses yesterday, and the price paid for this was good.

The average quality of the tobacco being brought in now is not all that could be desired from the standpoint of the warehousemen, but the quality is expected to improve as the time passes.

The majority of the weed sold here yesterday averaged around 21 cents per pound.
