Col. Pratt's Plan Interests McLean

ASHEVILLE, Dec. 2. (AP)—A state commission for the development of plans for the working out of national resources in connection with industry may be established during the next administration, according to the statement of Colonel Joseph Hyde Pratt, president of the western North Carolina, incorporated. Colonel Pratt stated that he had a conference with Governor-elect Angus W. McLean and that the new Governor was very much interested in such a plan.

Mr. McLean did not state positively that he would advocate such a commission, said Colonel Pratt, but he did state that such a commission might be created, and that he was vitally interested in the accomplishing of the work that this commission would set to do.

Colonel Pratt expressed the belief that the commission would fill a long felt want in the state, and that it would be of value to the state in many ways.

AUSTRALIAN WAR PREMIER, W. M. HUGHES, PLAYS JAPAN

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 24.—"As a nation," says war premier William Morris Hughes, supporting the Singapore base project, and the Britten (Washington) congressional resolution for a Pacific conference of "white nations" exclusively in a fiery speech here today, "Japan has all the characteristics of a monkey, including the tail."
