According to the Norfolk authorilying on Virginia beach with a hole through his brain and an army .45 clutched tightly in his hand, it was a clear case of suicide, as the man and concealed his identity by cutting all laundry marks and initials off his clothes.

The description of the body, as ed Mr. Anderson by T. L. Petty, North, insusctor of detectives, was: "Unidentified man described as thirty years. Five feet, ten inches, hundred and sixty pounds. Dark nuburn hall, fair complexion, Good teeth, No birth marks or scars. Dressed in brown tweed suit. Herringbone gray overcoat. Tan shoes, Blue gray hat, Handkerchief bore initial A,"
