The mother, Mrs. Ivy Hawkins, is in Texas trying to secure the release of her son William from a prison cell where he is slowly dying.
When the World was called, the son was 28 years old, married, prosperous and happy as the justice of the peace at Las Vegas, New Mexico. Never had there been a blot on his name. He entered the air service and rose from private to lieutenant. One day when making a landing at Tullahoma he was horrified as a little girl ran in front of his swift plane. He swerved the craft to save the child's life—and wrecked his life in doing so. In the crash he was injured about the head so that his mind was to become affected. When the lawsuit was signed Willie Hawkins did not return home.
The Doctor Jekyll, the respected and loved citizen of Las Vegas, had become a wandering Hyde. The first his parents heard of him was at Shreveport, La. He had become a forger of checks. It was a veritable mania of his. His mania left a trail of forged checks over the country. His parents were beguiled in settling spurious checks.
Finally the mother got the boy to her home in California. "But, oh, my boy was so changed," says the mother. Comrades of the boys who have met him since the war tell the same story. He is not the same gallant lieutenant who injured himself to save a child; the same soldier who, when cadets mutined at Cal field went out and pleaded with them to obey their superior officers and handled a serious situation.
After passing more checks in California, being thrown in San Quentin and later escaping from the state asylum, for he had been adjudged insane, the deranged youth came back to Texas. Here he passed more checks and was sent to Huntsville prison where the grueling work reduced him from 180 to 130 pounds in weight. A few months ago they put him in chains and took him to El Paso to try him for forgeries. In five minutes he was taken back to prison to give the state of Texas its eye for an eye.
My home is gone, my boy is gone, daddy is sick from all the troubles in California, but God will raise up friends to help me as He has and some day I will have Willie back."
