Dr. Francis Short Will Address Joint Gathering Of Clubs

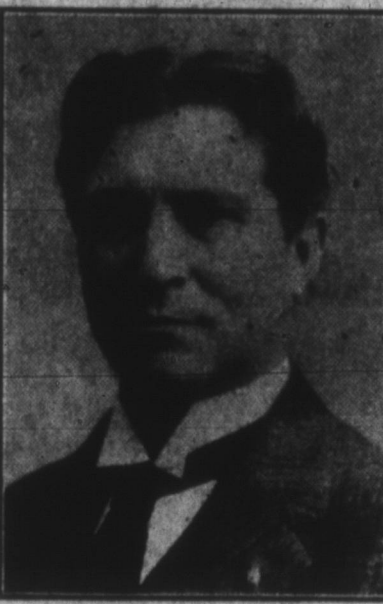
Educational Director for the J. C. Penney Company Said To Be Forceful Speaker

HARBOR OF MAINE TOWN

SUCKED DRY

Unprecedented Phenomenon Followed by Tidal Wave Causes Much Loss

SOUTHWEST HARBOR, Maine, Jan. 9. (AP)—An unprecedented phenomenon, apparently local in character, today sucked dry the harbor at Bernard, three miles from here, and then sent a ten foot tidal wave rushing back to the shore, carrying with it fifty fishing boats. The tidal wave was preceded by the distinct rumbles which led to the belief that an earthquake at the sea's bottom of shore may have caused the phenomenon, although no tremors were felt.

Two Men Escape

Two men, Chester Sawyer and Forrest Albee, were in their dory anchored a short distance off Parker's Wharf. They had the amazing experience of seeing the water sucked from beneath their craft as the harbor slowly was emptied after a deep rumbling sound that caused many inhabitants to fear an earthquake. As the keel of their boat touched the bottom, they leaped out and ran to shore, dodging the cakes that had tumbled down from the upper part of the harbor.

Many Boats Wrecked

A few seconds after the harbor had been emptied, the first of three tidal waves came sweeping against the shore. Many boats were broken up on the flats and were wrecked while those which rode out the first wave at anchor were caught in whirlpools and badly damaged.

The Boat Harbor was Exposed at Points Where a Few Seconds Before It Had Been from 8 to 10 feet deep.

McLean and Lacy to Make New York Trip

RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 9. (AP)—Governor A. W. McLean and State Treasurer B. R. Lacy expect to go to New York about the twentieth of January to sign a \$23,000,000 note issue, which the state is renewing. ALLEGED THIEVES ARE APPREHENDED

Seven Negroes, One of Pikeville, Arrested for Complicity in Store Robbery

A mystery which has puzzled the police for a month or more has been unraveled with the arrest of three negroes, charged with the larceny of several hundred dollars worth of staple merchandise from the wholesale grocery store of L. A. Toney company, have been systematically charged with receiving the merchandise, knowing it to be stolen goods. Norfolk Dixon, Richard Thomas and Richard Wynn are the negroes against whom the larceny charge has been placed and W. H. Whitted and William Sneed, negro storekeepers in the Little Washington section of the city; Will Thompson, operator of a store on North Center Street, and Randall Uzell, negro merchant of Pikeville, are alleged to have been the receivers of the illegally gained loot.

DURHAM MAN SLAIN BY NEPHEW

DURHAM, N. C., Jan. 9. (AP)—John James, 29 years old, of West Durham, was almost instantly killed this afternoon when a load from a shotgun took effect in his right abdomen. The shotgun was fired in some unknown way by T. J. James, Jr., six-year old nephew of the dead. The family was moving to another house, and the shotgun was leaning against a bed-room when the boy picked it up, it discharging almost simultaneously. James was standing by a fireplace at the time, not over ten feet away.

WOOLWORTH HEIRESS RINGS UP MILLIONS

Youthful Granddaughter of 5 And 10 Magnate Sells 50,000 Shares of Stock

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. (AP)—Fifteen year-old Barbara Hutton, grand-daughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth, has rung up one hundred million dollars on the cash register of the five and ten cent store business he founded. Yesterday her representatives sold 50,000 shares of Frank W. Woolworth Company common stock, which she inherited from her grandmother for more than \$10,000,000. It was one of the largest private sales of common stock in the recent history of Wall street.

HEAVY COOLING

DRIVER DISPERSED

Dave Hinson, 35 year old white farmer, was instantly killed about 9 o'clock Saturday evening when he was struck by a heavy truck owned by Covert and Co., while on his way to the city. Hinson's skull was fractured, either by the force of the blow or by the heavy impact with the pavement, when he was knocked down.
