CONTRARY TO PRISON ETHICS HE TELLS JUDGE

JOLIET, Ill., Nov. 22.—(AP)—In a suave and scholarly manner which two years of imprisonment have not erased Nathan Leopold, co-slayer of Bobbie Franks and a life prisoner at the State penitentiary barricaded himself behind a code of prison ethics and refused to testify about the slaying of deputy-warden Peter Klein last May and the subsequent escape of seven convicts.
