WHOLESALESAERS AND MANUFACTURERS HERE TODAY

DEMONSTRATE ELECTRICAL TRANSMISSION OF SIGHT

Gov. McLean Scheduled To Make Principal Address At Convention This Afternoon

Expect 200 Members of East Carolina Wholesalers and Manufacturers Association to Be in Attendance; at Morning and Afternoon Session; Will Elect Officers

From every town of Eastern North Carolina members of the Wholesale Dealers and Manufacturers Association of Eastern Carolina will come to Goldsboro today to attend the second annual convention of the association.

W. L. Thornton, secretary, here yesterday reported that probably 200 would come for the convention. The sessions will be held in the Hotel Goldsboro beginning at 10:30 in the morning. The morning session will be made up by the address of welcome by Mayor E. G. Porter; the response by C. A. Flynn, of Washington; a solo by Mrs. B. B. Pyle; minutes of the previous meeting by Secretary Thornton; of Wilson; and an open forum discussion. A luncheon will be served at noon.

The top-liners of the convention are scheduled to make their appearance at the afternoon session with Governor A. W. McLean and Hon. I. M. Bailey both down for addresses. Hon. Bruce Little, of Wilson, is scheduled to introduce Governor McLean. Following the talk by the Governor; John W. House, of Wilson, president of the Association will make his annual report. Then will follow the address by Mr. Bailey.

The appearance of Governor McLean here will be the first public appearance he has made since a visit to New York where he went to sign state bonds.

A report to the treasurer, M. G. Coyle, of Wilson, and of the secretary Mr. Thornton, of Wilson, will be made at the afternoon session.

The election of officers is scheduled as the concluding item of business.

Several Goldsboro men are among the present officers of the Association. G. S. Dewey is one of the directors. W. L. Rawlings a member of the transportation committee, and L. A. Roney a member of the legislative committee.

HAYES IS NAMED FEDERAL JUDGE

Will Preside Over Middle District Court Created by Last Congress

WASHINGTON, April 7. (AP)—John J. Hayes of North Wilkesboro, N. C., was appointed judge of the newly created middle district of North Carolina today by President Coolidge.

William C. Coleman, of Maryland, was appointed judge of the federal court of Maryland today by President Coolidge to fill the additional circuit recently created by Congress.

Appointment of Johnson J. Hayes as judge of the middle district of North Carolina by President Coolidge today ends a contest lasting several months before Hayes and Frank Linney, of Boone, who was district attorney for the old western district of North Carolina.

Due to failure of the deficiency appropriation bill to pass it had been expected that the appointment might be delayed as activities of court were expected to be somewhat curtailed by the lack of funds.

ROBBED HOME OF LARGE SUM

Bloodhounds Follow Trail To Home of Reed Negroes Not Far From Fremont

Two negroes by the name of Reed, of the Eureka section, were lodged in Wayne county jail yesterday charged with having been the parties who sometimes during Wednesday night entered the home of a Mr. Mumford about three miles north-east of Fremont and stole \$120.

Deputy Sheriffs J. C. Kornegay and George Copps, summoned to the Mumford home yesterday morning, secured blood hounds and the dogs followed a trail to the home of the Reed negroes about 400 yards from the Mumford house. The men were placed under arrest, the house having been surrounded.

As the party started to leave premises, \$120 was found lying at a corner of the house. This sum, it was thought, had been dropped out a window by one of the negroes as the deputies entered.

MANY WARSHIPS AT CITY HANKOW

Chinese Search Soviet Firms in Shanghai and Tientsin Says Reports

SHANGHAI, April 7. (AP)—China Police by white Russian volunteers late today surrounded the soviet consulate in the international settlement with orders to prevent anyone from entering or leaving the premises.

No reason for this action was given. It was stated that there was no present intention to raid the consulate.

Search Soviet Bank TIENTSIN. (AP)—Chinese police late today entered the French concession with permission of the consul and searched the Dahl Bank and various soviet trade firms. The Chinese detained all persons pending the search and removed documents for examination. French police took no part in the raid but maintained order outside.

Warships at Hankow

WASHINGTON (AP)—Official reports confirming the violation of Russian diplomatic immunity in Peking by soldiers and police vied for attention with disclosure that a fleet of 21 foreign warships has mobilized at Hankow, nationalistic political capital at a time when demands for reparations for the Nanking outrages are being drafted for presentation at Hankow.

Anderson Ordered To Leave State

YANCEYVILLE, N. C., April 7. (AP)—J. H. Anderson, Schoolfield, Va., man found guilty of simple assault by a Caswell jury today was exiled from the state in sentence imposed by Judge Harding. He was fined \$500 and given a sentence of two years on the roads, but the latter suspended on condition that he leave the state, to which he agreed. The judge in imposing judgement also required him to stay 200 miles away from Danville, Va., the remainder of his life.

WINSTON-SALEM, April 7. (AP)—About sixty boys and girls of the city high school left today for Richmond, Va., to sing at the Southern Conference of Musical Education, which has been in session in that city since Monday. SAPIRO ADMITS BORROWING SUM

Got \$2500 From Potato Buyer and Loaned it to Farmers Form Co-op Body

DETROIT, April 7. (AP)—\$2,500 loan from a member of the firm of potato buyers and distributors was traced through Aaron Sapiro to a group of growers in the process of organization by him in a cooperative selling association today in Sapiro's trial suit against H. W. Ford.

Sapiro, under cross examination for the 9th day by Senator Ford, chief of the Ford defense testified that the money was advanced by E. W. Weyl, whose name appears repeatedly in Sapiro's declaration of libel.

MANY FLEE FROM RISING WATERS

Scores Families in Section of Mississippi Have Bought Higher Ground

CLARKSDALE, Miss., April 7. (AP)—Scores of families whose homes in the Burkes Landing area, fifteen miles southeast of Clarksdale, are in danger from flood waters of the Mississippi river as a result of a threatened levee break had been removed tonight to other towns three miles distant where they are being cared for in safety.

Loses Life Trying Save That of Dog

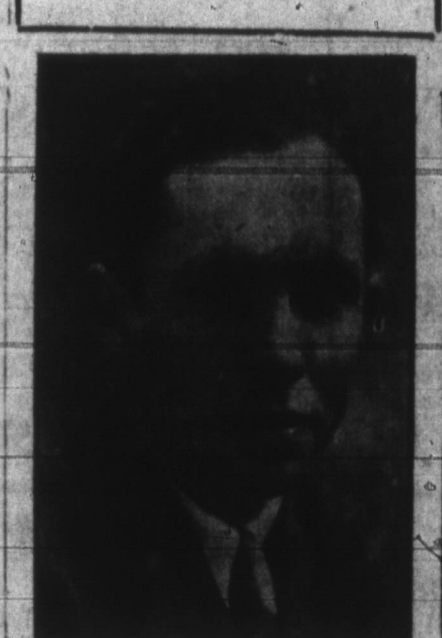

GILMORE MAKES GOOD WITNESS

Turner Case Jury Completed Yesterday Morning From Harnett Venue

SANFORD, April 7. (AP)—"I am swearing the truth or trying to" declared Walter Gilmore, eye witness to the gun battle that resulted in the death of Sheriff James Turner, when attorney Douglass of the defense sought to confuse him as to what his direct testimony had been. The cross examination of Gilmore, who was on the stand about two hours this afternoon, will be concluded in the morning.

Gilmore made a good witness maintaining almost intact his account of the affair in the face of disconcerting barrage of question, an there were times when his ready repartee created a ripple of amusement in the courtroom and Judge Sinclair rapped sharply for order. Hope That Experiment Will Have Importance as Vital as Beginning of Telephone, Telegraph, and Radio; Would Mean Speakers Could From Office Address Audience any Part of Country

WASHINGTON, April 7. (AP)—Hope that the electrical transmission of sight publicly demonstrated today for the first time in history, would have an importance as vital as the beginnings of the telephone, telegraph, and radio was expressed by Secretary Hoover.

This was part of the message the Commerce Secretary sent over the telephone wires from Washington to New York while instruments operating at the two ends of the line enabled him to address at the American Telephone and Telegraph company convention in New York to see him as he spoke.

Secretary Hoover sat in the telephone studio here before a large audience and spoke into an extension telephone. Rays of light played across his features constantly while he read slowly from his manuscript. Before and after he spoke he listened in on an extension telephone conversation between guests here and in New York.

"It is a matter of very great pride to have a part in this historic occasion," the Secretary said to his New York audience. "We are all of us familiar enough with the electrical transmission of sound. Today we have the very startling success of the transmission of sight for the first time in the world's history. It may be that after a while we can make little speeches like this and stay on the job here."
