Estimated Damage From Rain, Wind, Hall Storms Will Reach Million

BRISTOL, Ya., Tenn., May 80-(AP) -Twelve persons are known to have been killed more than a score are missing and many in-jured and property damaged to the extent of about a million dol-lars in a series of talu, wind, hailand electric storms that swept parts of Kentucky, Tennessee, and Virginia late last night and early today.
