Twenty Missing; Twelve Dead

Estimated Damage From Rain, Wind, Hail Storms Will Reach Million

BRISTOL, Va., Tenn., May 30 (AP)—Twelve persons are known to have been killed more than a score are missing and many injured and property damaged to the extent of about a million dollars in a series of rain, wind, hail and electric storms that swept parts of Kentucky, Tennessee, and Virginia late last night and early today.

Southeastern Kentucky, where rains of cloudburst proportions lasted eleven hours, converted mountain streams into torrents and drove people from their homes, reported the greatest loss of life with nine known dead, but it was feared that the total number of fatalities would be increased when communications were restored over the stricken area.
