### WATER PLANT

New Pump House and Pumps Should Care for City's Needs For 25 Years

Improvement of water plant facilities which should take care of the reeds of the city for the next twenty five years have been provided in the 70 Cases Docketed completion of plans for the erection of a new pumping house for the city system and the installation of two dual drive cumps.

The pump house will be erected by A. H. Guion Company, of Gastonia. who were low bidders for the work with a price of \$27,000. Construction work will probably start within the next two weeks and the contract will call for completion of the house within 150 days after the start. Three companies submitted bids for the work.

A raw water pump and high pressure pump will be rurchased from the Laval Steam Turbine Company. the raw water pump for \$3,548 and

the high pressure pump for \$7,800.

These pumps will be installed for operation by gas or by motor. At present rumps at the station are operated entirely by electricity and it is necessary to keep steam in the auxiliary system for emergency operation in the event the power current goes off. Under the dual system pumps to be installed, they can be immediately switched to the gas system for operation when the current goes off. This will eliminate the necessity of keeping steam in the boilers at all times, it was said.
