About 15 Gallons of Gasoline Thought Remained in Tank Not Being Used

GIRL KILLED WAS FIFTY FEET AWAY FROM TANK

Cap From Off Top of Outfit Struck Her in The Head, Death Instant

TARBORO, N. C., Oct. 6-(A) -One child was killed instantly and sour others injured, two probably fatally, when an old abandened gasoline supply tank on the Pinetope school grounds near here exploded late today.

The explosion occured when a boy playing at the tank, struck a match.

The school board had changed constructs for its gasoline supply and the old tank had been left on the school grounds by the vil com-

The tank, believed to have held about 15 gallons of gasoline, was an "attraction" for the children who played about it during recess and after school hours.

A small son of John Gardner, local resident, struck a match near the tanking causing the ex-

Young Gardner and his small brother received serious injuries, the former losing an arm and

A girl (tudent sitting 50 feet away studying her arithmetic levson was hit in the head by the tank cap and she died instantly. Reports tonight said two other children were also injured.
