MORE OYSTERS ARE CONSUMED

Belhaven and Vandemere Taking Lead in One of State's Enterprises

RALEIGH, Nov. 4.—(AP)—With the first month of the current oyster season past, a survey and inspection of the producing and marketing centers by T. H. McCrea, sanitary engineer of the fisheries division of the department of conservation and development, shows the volume of business in the oyster industry of the state greater than at any period during last season, he reports.

Observations by Mr. McCrea show all increasing business in each of the large producing and marketing centers. "Aside from the fact that the people of North Carolina are eating more oysters than ever before he declares, the northern markets are turning their attention to the North Carolina beds and numerous concerns have established themselves along our coast, investing a considerable sum of money in the industry.

The demand for oysters is greater in Washington than the supply, according to reports from there Mr. McCrea says, but with the addition of faster freight and oyster boats running from Washington Pamlico sound it is expected the industry will be able to catch up with the demand.

At Belhaven Mr. McCrea ascertained, the two largest packing houses in the state are running full time, even though the cold weather and the demand for oysters have not reached the peak of the winter season. Large refrigeration trucks are being put into operation by a large marketing company in Washington in order that the bivalves may be placed in the hands of the consumer as fresh as possible. This has extended

the market into state cities that have hitherto not had such facilities. A new concern from another state is helping develop new markets. Vandemere, says Mr. McCrea, is bidding for a piece on the state and northern markets with two large oyster houses and a goodly number of

shockers. A Maryland company is a newcomer in the field in that town, aiding in creating more markets for the North Carolina product. Twenty three oyster houses are reported doing a large volume of business at Morehead City. New Bern, birthplace of the state's
