C., Nov. 5—(P)—Furman University cut a wide gap through the Wake Forest Deacons here today and scattered the opponents like so much chaff in the winds and ran up eight touchdowns for a score of 53 to 0. This overwhelming score was accomplished by the first, second and third string Furman players while the brilliant quarter back Whitey Rawl sat on the bench as a spectator. Loney was a skyrocket through the line in the first half and teamed with the elusive Crawford to pile up touchdowns.

The final score was 7 to 0. North Carolina fought desperately to even the score for three quarters and outplayed the Cadets in every department of the game, lacking only the final punch when within a few yards of the goal. I.'s stubborn defense near the goal line and ballity to break up passed accounted in large measure for the victory. Pass after pass thrown by Ward in the final quarter

were knocked down by Cadet backs, and one intercepted by Harner, who replaced Nabor, gave the Cadets, an opportunity to score. Harner's replacement from the thirty yard line, however, was wide.

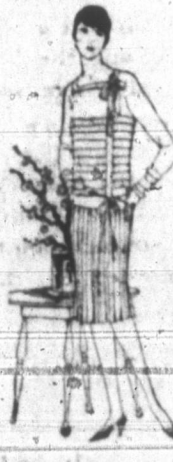
